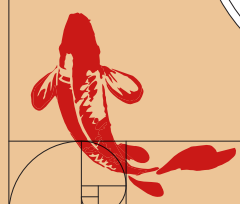
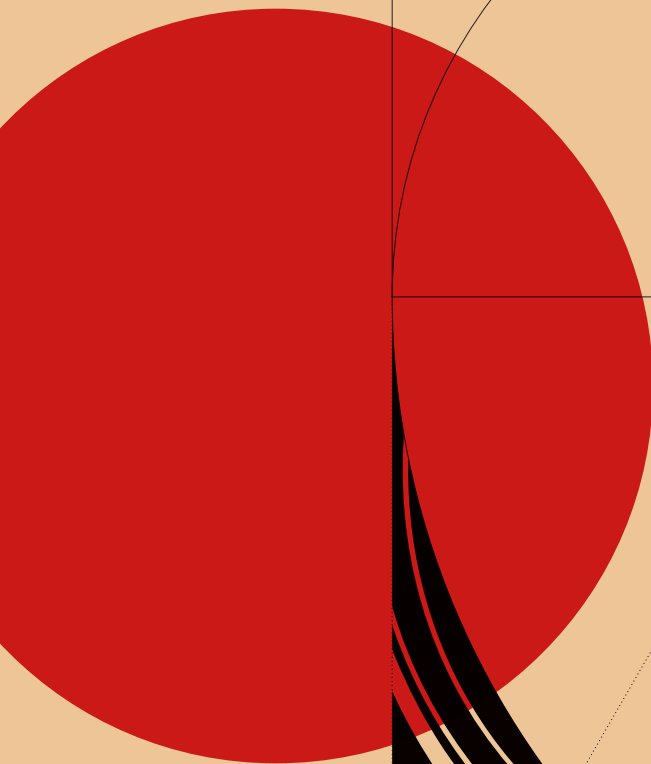

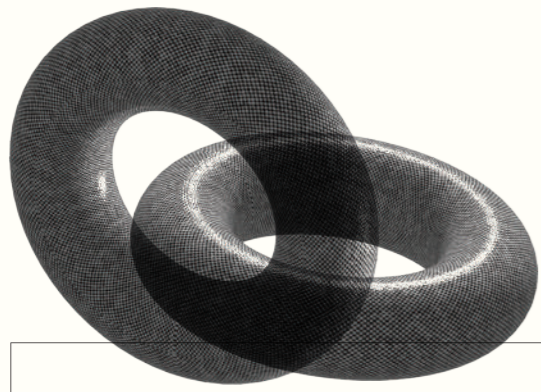

Where Philosophers Meet: Japan for the WCP 2028

The World Congress of Philosophy of FISP has long been providing a platform for philosophers from all over the world to discuss various philosophical issues related to our contemporary societies. Japanese philosophers have made many important contributions to past congresses. Now we have a strong and earnest wish to host, for the first time, the next meeting of the congress in the year 2028.

I. Tradition and Modernity

Japan has both an incredible depth and tremendous breadth of philosophical traditions. It has a long history of philosophy and religious thought rooted in Buddhism, Confucianism and Shintoism that stretches back to the 6th century of the Common Era. During the mid-19th century, Western Philosophy was introduced, and Japanese philosophers worked diligently to integrate many of these ideas into Eastern traditions. Our history, therefore, demonstrates the rich philosophical possibilities that emerge as a result of learning from other cultures. The challenges posed by contemporary culture and cutting edge technologies necessitate that we continue to think about how to live well in the 21st century. We believe that Japan can be a catalyst for interactions between, and the eventual integration of, diverse traditions of philosophical practice.

II. A World in Crisis

Our world and philosophies face divisions caused by the differing opinions of disparate political and cultural camps. This is why we sincerely wish to create a forum where people can, regardless of their political and cultural background, freely engage in discussions about different regions of the world, different historical events and viewpoints, and different fields in academia. Our world philosophy includes multiple traditions and provides a universal ground for philosophical dialogue. It provides a vantagepoint from which to reconsider our ordinary lives, popular culture, and the Universe. It allows us to reflect on what it means to be "human" in the light of virtual reality, robots, and AI. It liberates "philosophy" and opens it up to the public and the world.

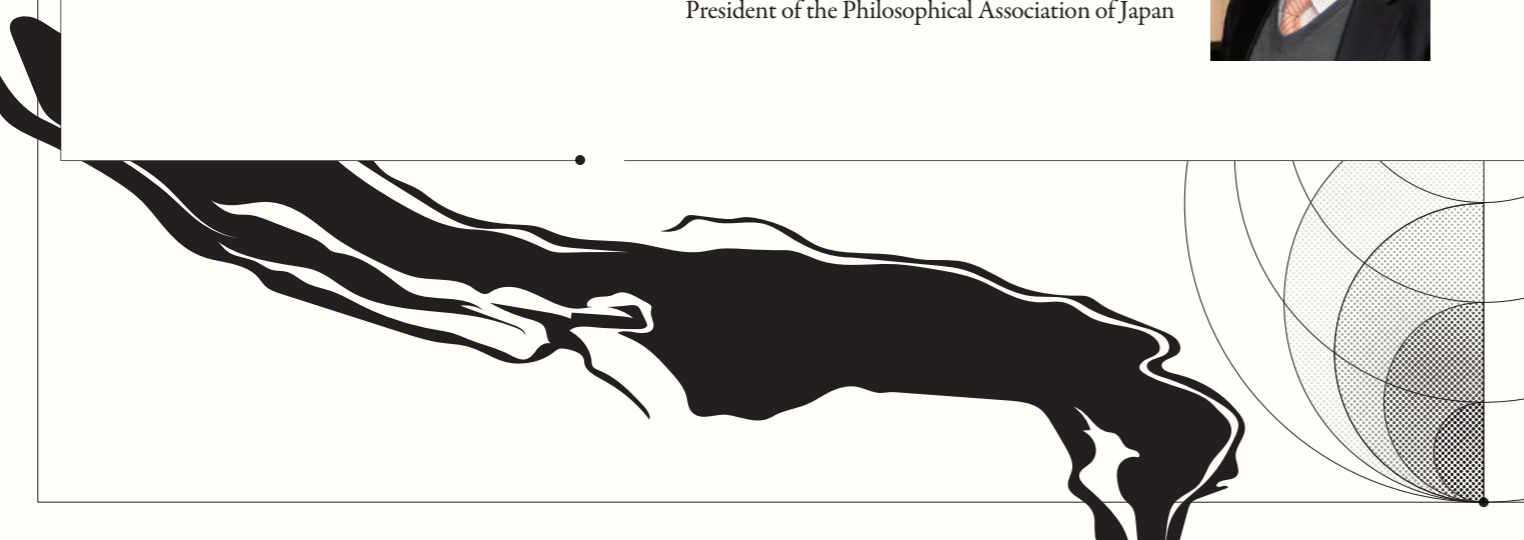
III. Tokyo: An Academic City

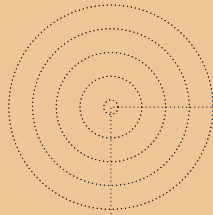
